A warm welcome to our Methodist Church

ARTFORD METHODIST Church is situated at the junction of Beach Road and Bradburns Lane. Sometimes known as the Centenary Chapel, it was opened in 1891, a hundred years after the death of the founder of Methodism, John Wesley. The building was renovated in 2000. It had replaced the original chapel, built in 1833, which is now the church hall

Today, the church prides itself on its warm, caring approach to members of the congregation, newcomers, and the wider community – both local and worldwide.

Visitors are welcome to attend the weekly Sunday services at 10:30am. The children and young people meet in the church at the beginning of the service and then leave for their own sessions. Coffee and tea are served afterwards allowing all those present time to chat and get to know one another.

Special services, held during the year, include September's Harvest Festival and the Gift Service on Advent Sunday, when gifts are brought for the Cheshire Community Development Trust. Each Christmas, the church hosts carol services for Winnington Park (to page eight)

The "People Called Methodists" have met in Hartford for over 200 years, originally in homes, then in what is now the Church Hall, just a few steps along Beach Road. As the congregation grew further, the Victorian church building was erected. Worship has been conducted there ever since.

Review of the 2015-2016 Season

he future of grassroots junior football in Hartford has never been so bright. The club continues to prosper, offering football to over 250 boys and girls from ages six to eighteen. A great team of volunteers has delivered fantastic growth and initiatives in recent seasons, securing the club's future in the local community. Our partnership with Hartford Church of England High School (with its ever improving facilities) continues to flourish. All fourteen of our Mid Cheshire Youth Football League (MCYFL) age group teams will train and play home matches at Hartford Campus next season.

There have been a few changes off the pitch too; none of this improvement would have been possible without the determination of Jonathan Fallows who, for the last seven seasons, has held key club positions of Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer, providing a stable platform for fresh blood to come in and drive the club forward. A sincere thank you to Jonathan as he steps down after wonderful service, with Adrian Argyros and Richard Lamb taking over as Club Secretary and

Chairman respectively.

After a punishing schedule of nine matches in 28 days, including two high pressure Cup Finals, the Hartford FC under-18 team (actually only under-17), achieved a fantastic and unique League and Cup double, the like of which has not been seen in recent memory at the Club - possibly ever (we have limited historic records)!

A disappointing showing in the League Cup final versus Middlewich, where Hartford FC lost by a solitary goal, could have seen many teams spiralling into a dip in form and an anticlimactic end to the season; instead

despite injury, suspension and a host of other obstacles, the boys ground out a run of fantastic results to achieve this unparalleled goal! The weekend after the League Cup defeat brought the District Cup Final, in which the team bounced back with a stylish, hard fought, 3-2 victory over Helsby, its first ever cup final success.

With games in hand in MCYFL Division 1, there was still the opportunity to challenge for the title. The two cup finals had taken their toll, and the boys would have to rely on a depleted squad of twelve players, including a stand-in goal keeper, for their last six league matches. Great spirit and commitment saw the team compete valiantly against all the top teams in the league, with four fantastic wins and a draw seeing them clinch the league title, with one match to spare, and become double winning champions!

Hartford will soon possess a superb state of the art 3G football facility at Hartford Campus. To coincide with the opening of this facility, Hartford FC is stepping up a gear and expanding its current under-6 group into a full Early Years Academy, with increased qualified coaching resources, providing a fantastic experience for young boys and girls in the area. The 2015-16 season, saw a number of bright stars begin and progress their footballing journey to a higher level. Under-8 player Laurence Giani












signed academy forms for Stoke City, and under-13 duo Luke Chambers and Ben Evans signed academy forms for Port Vale. Meanwhile, former Hartford FC player Francesca Bentley, who played for the Club for four years, made her debut for England Womens Under-15s versus Germany in Dussledorf! On Saturday 11 June, the club met for its annual award and trophy presentations at Winnington Park Rugby Football Club, the highlight of



the day being the now traditional match between Hartford FC Under-18 Stags and Hartford FC Veterans, with the Veterans grabbing a last minute equaliser to make the score 5-5. This was played as a community sport match, for the nominated charity of 1874 Northwich - £160 pitch side collection was raised for the Neuromuscular Centre, Winsford.

Public Open Forum

Two members of Hartford Bowls Club requested a list of dates when the Village Hall is booked. There were also concerns relating to payment of rent. The lease is shared between the Bowls Club and Hartford Tennis Club. The invoice had been issued to the Tennis Club and paid in full by it.

One member of the public expressed concerns about Phase 2 of the Grange Farm development, particularly about the lack of a badger survey, and the vacuum sewage plant located immediately behind 14 Walnut Lane which is running overnight. The Clerk is to follow this up with CWaC.

Cheshire West and Chester Council

Councillor Susan Kaur

Cabinet had met on 8 June and approved the Neighbourhood Plan. The Plan now forms part of the Development Plan for CWaC and will be taken into account in local planning decisions. The Council has published a decision statement which sets out the decision to make the Neighbourhood Plan and the reasons for doing so.

It was also agreed that planning applications decided after the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) is introduced will need to pay the CIL charge in Hartford, enabling Hartford to benefit from the levy. This is an excellent result for Hartford. Thanks are due to Northwich Town Council for its support, in what has become a brilliant example of two local councils working together to achieve a successful outcome.

However, it was difficult to find land within the village, until Woodland Trust granted WCMO the lease of land in Thorn Wood. Bearing in mind the position of Thorn Wood, within the parish boundary of Hartford, WCMO has decided to call the orchard simply 'The Memorial Orchard', as it now wishes the orchard to provide an amenity for Hartford, Weaverham and neighbouring communities. In other words, it will be a community orchard not only for Weaverham but for Hartford residents as well. WCMO has invited all the schools in Hartford and Weaverham to send pupil representatives to the Service of Dedication and Remembrance on Monday 12 September, at 2:00pm. 

Pink Poo success

Cleaning up Marshall's Arm

Sunday 5 June marked the end of the Marshalls Arm Pink Poo Campaign. Volunteers and their families celebrated, in glorious sunshine, at a barbeque hosted by Northwich Rowing Club. Over the course of May, volunteers took routes through the reserve, counting and spraying (in pink!) the examples of dog mess that had been left by irresponsible dog owners. You may have seen the pink fluorescent jackets throughout the reserve. Some passers-by also provided positive feedback about the campaign - "Keep up the good work, it is making a difference"; "it's about time the issue was highlighted - well done!"

The numbers clearly demonstrate a decrease in the amount of dog poo found in the



reserve, as a result of highlighting the poo. On the first occasion some 240 examples of dog mess were counted and highlighted: on the third, this number fell to around 70. Such a reduction in the mess left in the reserve means a safer and cleaner environment for all to the enjoy the trails particularly as Summer approaches. Since May's Pink Poo campaign was so successful, volunteers are considering rerunning the campaign, with the aim of making Marshall's Arm completely free of dog poo.

Many members of the current group of Pink Poo volunteers became involved following the first Marshall's Arm Dogs Day Out held earlier in the year.

The reserve will be holding a similar event on Sunday 20 August. The Dogs Day Out is a family day for all - whether you have a dog or not! This Summer's event, to be held in the meadow, will include dog treats and competitions in which to enter your dog (and maybe win a prize for your pooch!). There will also be a professional dog trainer offering a demonstration and advice throughout the day! We hope to see you there.

Responsible owners are welcome at Marshall's Arm, and in most areas of the village. The Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 says "If a dog defecates at any time on designated land and a person who is in charge of the dog at

that time fails to remove the fæces from the land forthwith, that person shall be guilty of an offence...".

Not only is dog mess unpleasant, it carries a number of health risks. As ever, the simple message is

"bag it and bin it". A securely sealed plastic bag of dog waste can be disposed of in any litter bin - of which Hartford has plenty.

If you are not prepared to clean up completely after your dog please do not walk it in a public place.



ust in time for the Summer holidays, Hartford News has a small supply of free maps to give away (subject to availability) to Hartford residents. Either map could guide you, whether you are on two feet or two wheels.

The Sustrans Active Travel Map covers Northwich, features trafficfree cycle routes, and includes contact details for a number of relevant organisations.

The Bikeabiltv Map covers Northwich and Winsford, and is linked to the Bikeability scheme, today's cycle training programme.

Bikeability is about gaining practical skills and understanding how to cycle on today's roads. The map details local cycle routes according to Bikeability "levels", so you can find a route that suits your ability.

To get your maps, send an email (including your home address) to Hartford News; the editor (and, in all probability, his dog) will bring it to you. Note: if you took up this offer in 2015, the *Bikeability Map* is the same as the one you already have.


to Anna Godden (who lives in Hartford with her partner, Joe, and their dog Susie) in May. Caron opened the business in July 1999, and

Activities in the nearby church hall include a Friday morning mums' and toddlers' group in term-time, monthly Ladies' Fellowship meetings, and weekly table tennis sessions. The social committee also organises various events such as bowling, a film night, lunches and countryside walks. number of other local organisations use the hall, and it is available for private hire. Usefully, it has a large car park. The congregation regularly supports the Mid Cheshire Food Bank with donations

of food. Several members of the church are also volunteers at the food bank warehouse and at a number of the distribution centres. In this country the



church also supports Methodist Homes for the Aged and Action for Children. Overseas help is given to Christian Aid, Water Aid and a school and HIV/Aids clinic near Mombasa, Kenya.
